**The Deputy Speaker:** Good morning, Honorable Members, and welcome to our today's sitting. Clerk, next order!

### COMMUNICATION FROM THE CHAIR

VISITING STUDENTS FROM MAJOR MULUVI KANGWENI SECONDARY SCHOOL

Honorable Members, I would like to acknowledge the presence of visiting students from Major Muluvi Kangweni Secondary School in Nzambani Ward in our public gallery today. They are accompanied by their teacher, Madam Teresia Mwalimu, and Victor Makau. In our usual tradition of receiving and welcoming visitors to this assembly, I extend a warm welcome to them and on behalf of the County Assembly of Kitui and on my own behalf, I wish them a fruitful visit.

Honorable Members, I will give any member a few minutes to also welcome the students and offer a word of encouragement. I can see the honorable member representing Nzambani where the school is situated, Honorable Joseph Musyoka Mbite, the youngest in the assembly.

**Hon. Joseph Mbite:** Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Sir, for granting me this opportunity. Yes, indeed, Major Muluvi Secondary School is in my ward, at Maluma location.

Mr. Speaker, I take this opportunity to pride myself with the great people of Nzambani Ward, who elected me to this August House, some being their mothers, others being their fathers, others being their brothers and sisters.

Mr. Speaker, it is also good I welcome them to this Chamber where we debate, we legislate, and make laws regarding our great County – Kitui. Mr. Speaker, Sir, I challenge the students that

today, let it just not be a norm that they have a curriculum outside the normal school curriculum. Let them have a take-home – something that they will learn from this House. Let them feel free also to interact with the Honorable Members after the rise of the House, take a tour of the Chamber, and take some of the challenges positively so that also they are going to be impacted differently.

Mr. Speaker, Sir, also it is good that I inform the students from Major Muluvi School that out of the 60 members of County Assembly of Kitui, I Joseph Musyoka Mbite, a.k.a. *Mameni* from Nzambani ward, I am the youngest in this County Assembly. Therefore, it is something that I celebrate, it is something that I'm always proud of because the people of Nzambani elected me to be their representative.

Again, I would like to challenge them that also as they experience and as they interact with the Chambers, Mr. Speaker, let them set the bar high in terms of academic performance. Some of us here never went to high-end secondary schools and high schools. Like myself, I attended Yumbisye Secondary School. But I went out of my way to do the extra work so that I could get my grade to university, which I achieved very well.

Therefore, I challenge the students from Major Muluvi Secondary School that, let them not be lied to by anybody that it is not doable, it is not possible, but rather today, let them walk with their heads and shoulders high regardless of their secondary school. It is possible to make it to University and even achieve greater heights in life.

Therefore, dear students from my ward, I am proud of you. I also extend an invitation after the rise of the House, we take a photo, have a chat and also share a cup of tea. Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Sir. I love these my students. I know also with your permission, some of them will be voters in 2027 and therefore, I beseech them, when that time comes, let them vote for Honourable Joseph Musyoka-Mbite. Thank you.

**The Deputy Speaker:** Thank you, Honourable Joseph Musyoka Mbite, Member for Nzambani ward. Indeed, you are the youngest, and yes, it is doable. They can achieve it from anywhere because it's just about commitment to their studies.

Honourable... Is it Rose Kasyoka? Yes, it is. Honourable Rose Kasyoka.

**Hon. Rose Kathoka:** Thank you, Mr. Speaker for giving me this opportunity to join you and Honourable Mbite to welcome the students of Major Muluvi Secondary School.

As a mother of boys, I'm very proud to see young men growing. I want to tell you, young men, we know somehow is like the boy child has been neglected. But I tell you, your mothers are with you. Most of the times when you see in the TVs, you only see the girl child, the girl child and the boy child somehow feels like he's not part of the community. Today, I want to confirm to you that you belong to the community. (We have the trust in you because you are our leaders of tomorrow.

Secondly, I want to tell you that today, I think it's a learning moment for you. For those who are Catholics, there is a saint called Saint Ignatius of Loyola and he said, "Every day is a learning moment." So, I'll urge you today as you are within the County Assembly of Kitui, please have a learning moment to take home.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker, for giving me this time. Welcome, my young boys. I'm a mother of one boy and I'm very proud of boys. Thank you so much, Mr. Speaker.

**The Deputy Speaker:** Thank you, Honorable Rose Kasyoka, for the encouragement. Honorable Lieutenant Colonel Retired Alphonse Mukwayu, Member for Kyome/Thaana Ward, kindly.

**Hon.** Alphonse Mukwayu: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I also would like to join you in welcoming the students of Major Muluvi Secondary School, as I also join their member of the County Assembly Honorable Mbite.

First of all, Mr. Speaker, let me say I know Major Muluvi, the person himself, very well. I worked with him. We were in the same brigade – the second brigade before he left the Army to come and join politics and actually, he was elected a member of the National Assembly in Wiper party and was also in charge of elections in the party.

Mr. Speaker, let me congratulate the students also for finding time to come here and tell them it's good to concentrate seriously on studies. Personally, I have also been to secondary school. As Honorable Mbite said, it doesn't matter which school you go to. You are the one who determines what you want to get in that school. There are people who study outside class and they pass very well. And therefore, I'm urging them to concentrate so much in their studies.

Mr. Speaker, let me urge the boys that when they grow up, as they hear of Major Muluvi, I urge them also to join the Army. Let them join the Army, defend the country and then when they get to the Army; in the Army, we join the Army and say, "join the Army and be all that you would like to be." When I joined the Army, I became what I wanted to be. And I'm still becoming what I want to be. And that's why, Mr. Speaker, when I joined the Army, I did all the fighting in the ground. We call it infantry, with Major Muluvi. Thereafter, I decided to be a pilot. I went to become a pilot and later, I decided to be a politician. And very soon, I may decide to be a DC and I will be a DC thank you, Mr. Speaker. I welcome the students.

Meanwhile, Mr. Speaker, Sir, I also would like to thank Honorable Musyoka Mbite because both of us were the oldest men here and now he has decided to be the youngest, so I'm left alone. I will earn all the respect alone. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

**The Deputy Speaker:** Thank you, Honorable Alphonse Mukwayu. Between...your retirement, Lieutenant Colonel, you were a little bit senior to Major Muluvi, right?

**Hon. Alphonse Mukwayu:** Yeah, Mr. Speaker, a Major in the Army commands something called a company. (A company is a group of 1,200 men with all their vehicles and all their weapons. But a Colonel commands a battalion. A battalion consists of four companies. That means four Majors are under a Colonel. Thank you.

**The Deputy Speaker:** That is to say you were commanding four Majors? Congratulations. We are happy to have such men with us here.

**Hon. Alphonse Mukwayu:** Mr. Speaker, when the time I retired, I was actually commanding that time. I was actually commanding a place called a sector commander. A sector, actually, I was in the United Nations and now a sector consisted of four Governors. That is in Southern Sudan. So I was commanding four Governors by the time I retired. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

**The Deputy Speaker:** Thank you. Let us leave it at that now because it will get complicated when (13:02) somebody will question a military man commanding Governors. It will

complicate the matter further. Honorable Members, let us proceed to the next order if there is nobody else. Clerk, next order!

**Hon. Joseph Mbite:** Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Sir. Mr. Speaker, I was requesting that now that Honorable Kimanzi Muange has given notice of the motion, kindly may the Governor's speech be availed to Honorable Members in good time, because the debate starts tomorrow, such that maybe today we spend the rest of the day and the entire night perusing it for the purposes of a good debate tomorrow. Nevertheless, it is the Member's right to raise it at any point, but let us also be informed by why we do some things, the objectives, the things we want to achieve, and what is on the table. Thank you, Honorable Members. Let us be upstanding so that we adjourn.
